Happy New Year, Benevola!

Grace and peace to you as we turn the corner into another year. 

United Methodist Men call for Potato Drop Donations



For several years, The Baltimore-Washington Conference United Methodist Men have facilitated Potato D rops throughout our Conference to feed the hungry. Potato Drops have been delivered to churches, soup kitchens, and the Salvation Army. Unfortunately, the cost of diesel fuel and

other items have increased to the point that we have run out of funds and are not able to have potatoes delivered to our Conference for the remainder of the year. The remaining Potato Drop deliveries have been canceled for 2018.

In order to keep the drops from being canceled again, they need your help with a donation. All funds collected will be sent to The Society of Saint Andrew Potato Project – Feed the Hungry. Please put "Pototo Project" in the memo line of your check. Each Potato Drop delivery cost \$4,500. They hope to have seven Potato Drops in 2019 for a total cost of \$31,500.

Baltimore County Christian Workcamp – July 21 – 26, 2019



This was founded in 1984 by two pastors and is now run by lay people typically repairing about 40 houses throughout Baltimore County mostly during just one week. Volunteers commit for one day or as many days as their schedules allow and can sleep in their own beds each night.

There is a kick off dinner, silent auction, and orientation on Sunday, July 21 at Hunt's Memorial United Methodist Church in Riderwood, west of Towson. Breakfast is also held at Hunt's each day. After preparing a bag lunch, volunteer workers of all ages and with varying skills and abilities can choose a work site suitable to their talents and/ or interests. All types of repairs are tackled both inside and outside – plumbing, electrical, carpentry, dry wall, roofs, simple concrete work, ramps, porches, steps, insulation, painting, caulking, yard work, general cleanup, and any other needs that may arise. All ages are welcome: anyone under age 16 must be accompanied by adults. Especially needed are workers skilled in the areas of carpentry, masonry, plumbing, house painting, electrical wiring, and roofing. All must have their own medical/ accident insurance to participate.

The cost is \$25 for all week or \$6 a day. Fees help cover meals, expenses, etc. Registration forms are available on the website, <u>www.bcchristianworkcamp.org</u>. Forms or donations should be mailed to Baltimore County Christian Workcamp, P.O. Box 5082, Timonium, MD 21094.
